Beloved in Christ,

I am writing to update you on the current state of affairs. There are certainly plenty of different stories circulating. When you hear “news”, please check it out with a member of the vestry or with me before passing it on. I am requesting that you do so, because there has apparently been intentional misinformation circulated in order to cause more turmoil and anxiety.

First of all, there is a great deal of concern about the ownership of our property and the challenges to it by the Episcopal Diocese. Since there has been little or no news, some believe the worst. The reality is that we have formed a negotiating team of some of our most experienced negotiators. In the next few weeks the team will be further trained by diocesan negotiators. We have also consulted legal professionals, as well, who have a great deal of expertise in this field. In short, we will have a combination of both parish and diocesan resources marshaled to defend our assets. We are neither sitting back waiting, nor have we surrendered. Part of the delay has been due to the Episcopal Diocese unexpectedly finding that some congregations were willing to walk away from their buildings, rather than pay tribute and acknowledge the Dennis Canon as binding, thereby causing them to reevaluate their strategy. As developments occur, I will update you.

Secondly, a great controversy and angst has arisen over the Commission on Ministry's denial of Postulancy for Bill Owens. The Ordination Process is, for laypeople, a confusing process. The process itself may even seem daunting for those in the process. First, seminary and ordination are two very different things. You may attend seminary without being ordained and you may be ordained without a seminary degree.

The process works like this: After a minimum of three years in a sponsoring parish (and a “careful inquiry” by the rector and parish ministry discernment committee), a person may apply for Postulancy for Holy Orders. The process begins with an interview with the bishop, or canon, who makes an initial assessment of suitability for ordination. From there, the aspirant undergoes physical and psychological exams, before interviewing with the Commission on Ministry. The COM recommends either for or against continuing in the process. Upon approval, the aspirant is made a Postulant for Holy Orders. Normally, at this time, the bishop instructs the Postulant concerning choice of a seminary. (Please remember seminary and ordination are two separate tracks that often overlap.)

Commission Reports:

Christian Education/Youth

Derek Peske reported that the

youth have a schedule for the rest of the summer. The Bible Study is moving ahead, with E-100 participants enjoying the Bible readings.

Communications

Steve Swencki participated in another Webinar on Website development. A website should communicate our tie in to the community, commitment and culture. A faith statement needs to be added. Steve "Googled" key words and the Christ's Church site popped up high on the list.

Fellowship

Chris Mollica distributed sheets that will be included in the bulletin. She is planning for the Bishop's visit. The Parish Picnic will be held on July 17 at Lynch Field.

Property

Tim Moore reported on the CE Building rewiring project. The power is switched on the outside of the building and the new panel is in place. A few rooms need to be rewired and new lights on the main floor. The Tunnel Street entrance doors are being painted and will be installed soon. The landscaping and clearing of weeds on the property will take place in May. Tim is working on costing to bring both buildings up to safety code.

Stewardship

Gordon Graham reported that there are 103 pledging units and are hopeful for a few more.

Worship

David Manson reported on the Financial Policy. There are several places where information needs to be completed. All were encouraged to take it with them, review it and submit suggestions to David.

The number of choir members is growing. Communication between

the Director of Music Ministry and the Vestry Representative continues to improve. Chris Mollica reported that the children involved with Children's Choir are enthusiastic.

Services are no longer being recorded. David is looking for help/information on a newer computer system.

David Leuthold proposed several objectives/goals for himself for the coming year. David reported that 16 people attended Tuesday's Informational Meeting. The tone was theological at that meeting.

Summer Sunday School

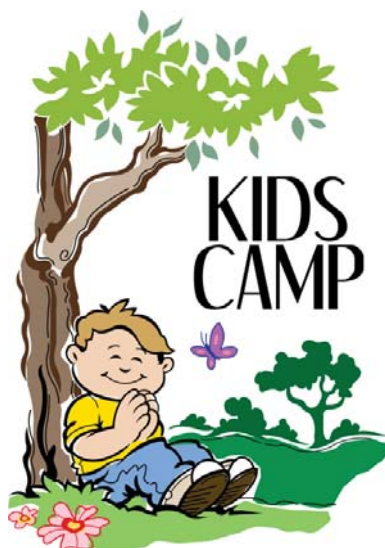
Summer Sunday School begins on May 29th.

We run a group lesson for the kids from Preschool through 5th grade during the summer.

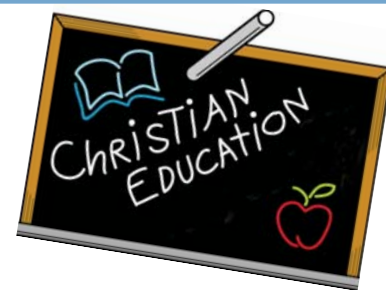
The Nursery is open in the summer too. We ask parents to help.

AUGUST 8th - 12th

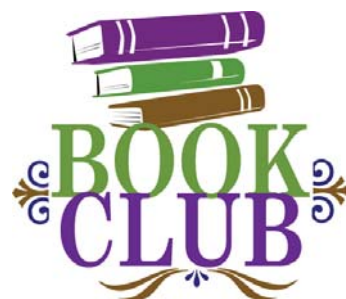
Kid's Camp will be from **6 - 8 PM** in the Diane Robertson Room. The theme this year will be Hometown Nazareth, where Jesus was a kid.

Following the Postulant's second (middler) year of seminary, further interviews are conducted for Candidacy for Holy Orders. Once a Candidate, one is able to take ordination exams – both written and oral. After passing these examinations, with the approval of both The Standing Committee and Bishop (provided there is suitable placement available) the Candidate is ordained either to the vocational diaconate or the transitional diaconate. Transitional deacons spend 6 to 12 months serving as a deacon before being ordained priest. It is very important to note that an individual's process toward ordination may be terminated at any time by the diocese or by the person pursuing ordination. Please see me personally should you have more detailed questions concerning the process.

Of particular concern in Bill's case were previous marriages. This is something of which Bill and I were clearly aware when he joined our parish family. Unfortunately, the Bishop's reception was not the appropriate forum for a discussion of this nature. His Grace has met with Bill, Amy and their children and apologized for the way in which the discussion was handled. He has also affirmed Bill's call to ordained ministry, but "not at this time". I have no insight into what that means for the Owens family or for our parish. The immediate answer is that Bill needs to find FULL TIME employment with benefits immediately. As much as we would love to add him to our staff, there simply are not sufficient funds at this time. Once again, we are encountering a shortfall in contributions.

So what do we do with all this? Both issues cause a huge amount of stress for us all. I have gotten fairly good at not showing that I'm stressed, but I see it in myself and a majority of our parish family. There really is only one answer for right now – we must be about our mission! Jesus' last words to His disciples in Matthew 28: 18-20 were: "Go therefore and MAKE DISCIPLES of all nations...teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you..."

Jesus NEVER says that it will be easy to follow Him! In fact, He says just the opposite (Luke 9: 23 – 26). Following Him is usually difficult and often painful, BUT Jesus makes it clear that all our difficulty here pales in comparison with the joy and beauty that lies ahead for those who love and obey Him. You and I have the great honor of being called to serve the Lord Jesus in very difficult times. We also have the assurance that we need not do it in only our human strength, but have the promise of fruitful ministry if we will "abide in Him" (John 15).

In all of this turmoil, rest assured that God has a plan for Bill, Amy and their family, a plan for our parish, and a plan for each of us (Ephesians Chapter 1). While we may not recognize His hand in our lives at the time, we will look back on this time and say, "Look at how the Lord Jesus used us in His service!"

May each one of our lives and the very life of our parish give honor and glory to our Lord and our God!

Negotiating Team for Christ's Church, Greensburg, Pennsylvania: Howard Finney, lead negotiator, The Reverend Lawrence Knotts, Gordon Graham, Robert Wicker, Ralph Artuso, and James Smith as alternate. This team is appointed for the purposes of entering into good faith, without prejudice, negotiations concerning any claims that The Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh of The Episcopal Church or the Episcopal Church (TEC) may assert over Christ's Church, Greensburg, PA, property. The negotiating team has the authority to represent the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of Christ's Church, Greensburg, PA, in such negotiations, but must obtain specific vestry authorization, by written resolution, before entering into any final agreement. Derek Peske moved, Tim Moore seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Appraisal of the church, CE Building and Playground: Gordon Graham will contact an appraiser to put a value on the 3 properties for use as is and for general use.

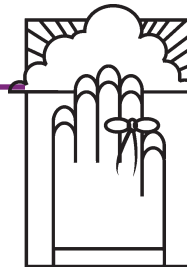
PEACE Program

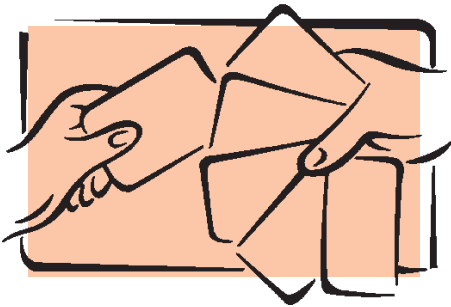

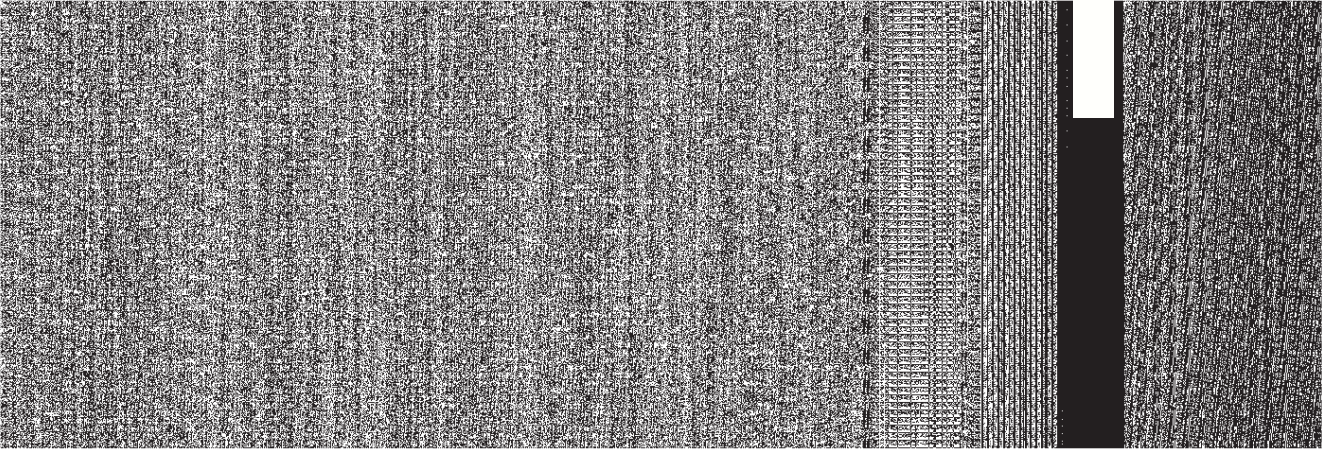

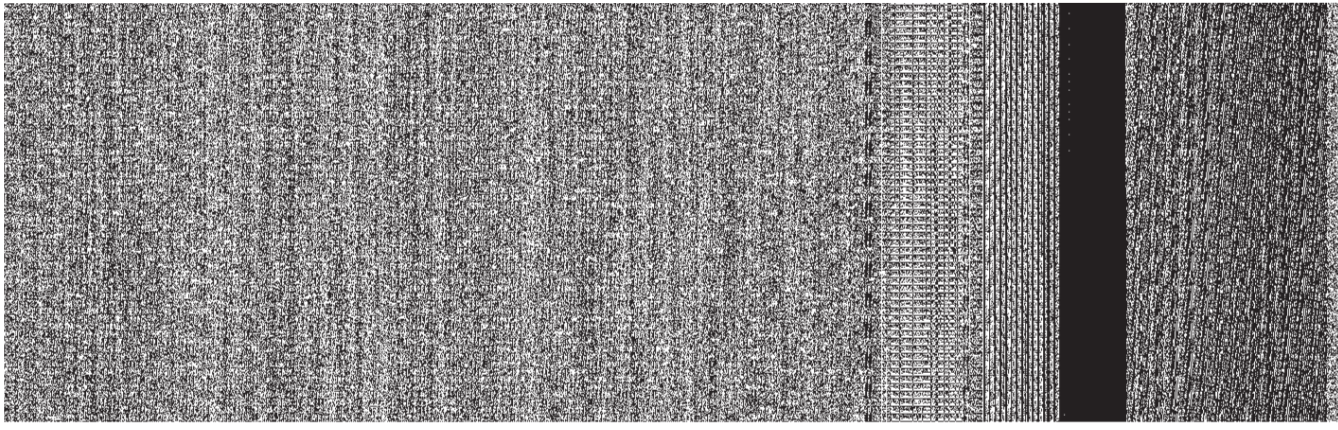
