

The History

The first known Episcopal services in Greensburg were in 1813 and it is believed that the nucleus of this congregation was the outcome of the missionary efforts of the Rt. Rev. William White, Bishop of Pennsylvania.

Christ Church, Greensburg was organized in 1822 by the "Society for the Advancement of Christianity in Pennsylvania" who sent a Deacon, The Rev. Moses Bennett to this western country. An announcement in The Greensburg Gazette of March 29, 1822 informed the people of Greensburg and vicinity that an election of church wardens and vestrymen would be held at the Court House at 12:00 noon on Easter Monday for the purpose of organizing a congregation. It was one of the first parishes west of the Allegheny Mountains. The Parish Charter was signed on November 27, 1822 and granted by a special act of the State Legislature on January 31, 1823.

The first church building was erected on a piece of property given by Judge William Jack on the east side of Maple Avenue (then Front St.) about midway between East Pittsburgh and Otterman Streets. The plans were drawn by The Rev. Dr. John H. Hopkins, Rector of Trinity Church, Pittsburgh. It was a brick structure of about fifty feet by thirty-five feet with four Gothic windows on each side, two in the east end and a circular one over the west end door. There was no tower or spire. In keeping with the architectural conventions of eighteenth century churches, there was no chancel or altar, as such, but the usual high pulpit stood at the east end, at the foot of which was a communion table, surrounded by a semi-circular communion rail. The organ and the choir were in a gallery located at the rear and beneath this was a sacristy and entrance. The cornerstone was laid on May 5, 1823 and the church, completed in the Spring of 1824 at a cost of \$1,683.00. On June 18, 1825 Bishop White consecrated it and confirmed sixty candidates prepared by The Rev. Dr. Hopkins, who had also baptized eighteen children during that year. In April 1831 a new organ was installed at a cost of \$140.00.

By the eighteen forties this church was in a dilapidated condition and by 1850 almost in ruins. It was therefore decided to tear it down and build a new one on a ninety foot by sixty foot plot of ground on the east side of Main Street, adjoining on the north side a street running parallel with the Pennsylvania Railroad, an alley on the east side and a lot belonging to a Mrs. Blair on the south side. The deed for the land upon which the second church was to be built, and upon which the present church stands, was conveyed by William and Harriet Jack to the Rector, Church Wardens and Vestrymen of Christ Church, Greensburg, Pennsylvania on October 7, 1851. On September 1, 1851 the cornerstone was laid by The Rt. Rev. Alonzo Potter D. D., Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by The Rev. W. H. Paddock, Rector but due to the lack of funds building was not commenced until August 1853. It was finished in the Spring of 1854 at a cost of \$5000.00 and consecrated on May 3,

1854 by the Bishop. While the new church was building, services were held in the Masonic Temple.

The first movement for the present church began on April 11, 1887 at the Regular Parish Meeting presided over by the Rev. George Van Waters, Rector. The most important question to come before this meeting was whether the old building should be repaired or a new one built, and there was only one vote in favor of repairing the old building. By 1889 the ground had been surveyed by W. W. Jamison, an engineer, the architect chosen, a Mr. Archer of Freedonia, New York, and a final decision reached. This third building, on the same site as the second one, is cruciform in shape, ninety-six feet long and almost sixty feet across the trancept. It has a seating capacity of four hundred. The architecture is English Gothic and the original plan called for a steeple on the tower but, on December 19, 1889, the Vestry decided to eliminate it and the tower was built as it stands today. The bell that was used for thirty-seven years in the second church hangs in the belfry. The walls are of local (Fayette County) sandstone and the ceiling is of red oak supported by beams which spring from a series of stone corbels beautifully carved as female heads - a gift of the Honorable George F. Huff. The chancel is recessed and its floor paved with Georgia marble. The memorial windows used in the chancel of the second building, a gift of Caleb Cope, Esq. of Philadelphia, were placed in the baptistry and a handsome rose window was installed in the front wall. The building contract was let to Jacob Shick. The cornerstone was laid September 27, 1889 by The Rt. Rev. Cortland Whitehead, D. D., Bishop of Pittsburgh, assisted by The Rev. Pedro S. Mesny, Diocesan Missionary. On December 2, 1891 the building was completed at a cost of \$30,000.00 and was consecrated by Bishop Whitehead.

The Christ Church Guild was founded in 1885 by The Rev. James B. Williams, Rector.


On the first Sunday in Advent, 1895 The Rev. Arthur Fidler introduced the first vested choir, a mixed group of twenty-four voices.

A happy note was struck on April 1, 1901, by a motion of the Vestry that the Secretary request special dispensation from the Bishop to allow women members of the church the right to vote on the election of vestrymen. The motion was carried and approved. The charter of Christ Church was amended on March 31, 1902 and the amendment was approved on April 13 of the same year.

In 1903, under the rectorship of The Rev. H. Hobart Barber, a new rectory was bought on North Main Street, the property of Mr. A. B. McGrew.

In May 1911, during the incumbency of The Rev. Arthur S. Lewis, Christ Church bought a new pipe organ from M. P. Moller of Hagerstown, Maryland for \$4100.00.

On January 30, 1923 the Centennial Anniversary of the Parish was celebrated under Dr. Shero's organization. On this occasion Bishop Mann made his first visitation



to Greensburg and Mr. Barber, the former Rector, was present and made an historical address.


During the rectorship (1941-1943) of The Rev. Thomas H. Carson a small altar was set up in the south trancept as a war shrine. It was dedicated on May 19, 1943 as the Chapel of Our Savior. Thirty-seven Christ Church communicants were listed on its World War II roll or honor.

In February, 1972 The Rev. Allen M. Miller was appointed by Bishop Appleyard to the office of Canon at Trinity Cathedral, Pittsburgh. He had served as Rector of Christ Church for fourteen years. He was succeeded by The Rev. David B. Van Dusen who accepted the call to the Christ Church Rectorship on September 3, 1972. His Institution was solemnized in Christ Church on Sunday, October 29, 1972 by The Venerable William G. Lewis, Archdeacon of the Diocese of Pittsburgh. The Rev. David A. St. Clair served as Supply Minister during the intervening period.

A combination of heavy rains and a leaking roof so severely damaged the 1911 Moller pipe organ that it became practically useless. Consequently, the Vestry set up an Organ Committee under the chairmanship of Junior Warden Robert Wicker to determine the feasibility of repairing the old organ or the necessity of buying a new one. If a new one was required, they were also charged with the responsibility of selecting the type (pipe or electronic) best suited to the church requirements. The decision was that a new one was necessary and a pipe organ made by M. P. Moller was selected — the manufacturer of the organ it replaced. The cost was \$14,850.00 and it was put into service on Sunday, October 29, 1972. The reinstallation of the chimes and the chime keyboard were donated by Mr. Victor Zuck of the M. P. Moller Co.

After having faithfully served for fifteen years as Choir Directors, Mr. and Mrs. James Nash retired December 31, 1972. They were succeeded by Mr. James Thompson, the organist.

Under the leadership of The Rev. Van Dusen, a Chancel Renewal Committee was formed on October 22, 1972 for the purpose of considering the desirability and practicability of a free-standing altar and other alterations in the Chancel. Mr. John A. Grove, Jr. was retained as the church architect. On Sunday, January 7, 1972 the congregation was informed of the several considerations involved and on Sunday, January 14, 1973 an opinion card was distributed to them reading: "Are you in favor of a free-standing altar? Yes ___No___ Comments _____" This was done for the guidance of the Vestry in their considerations of the recommendations of the Chancel Renewal Committee. After studying several plans prepared by the architect the committee made its selection on February 11, 1973 and reported to the Vestry that "The Chancel Committee recommends to the Vestry the installation of the present altar to a free-standing position and to include other necessary changes." At a Spe-



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cial Parish Meeting on March 6, 1973 the congregation voted sixty-nine "yes" and twenty-five "no". The recommendation of the Chancel Renewal Committee was approved by the Vestry at the regular meeting on March 13, 1973.

The One Hundred and Fiftieth Anniversary (1823-1973) of Christ Church was celebrated on Sunday, May 20, 1973. The service was conducted by The Rev. Van Dusen, Rector and the sermon preached by The Rt. Rev. Robert B. Appleyard, Bishop of the Diocese of Pittsburgh. He also confirmed twenty candidates presented by The Rev. Van Dusen. Following the service a buffet luncheon was served in the Undercroft. Memorabilia such as an old bible (1824), an old prayer book (1827), old photographs, etc. were displayed in the Sacristy, Undercroft and Parish House.

Christ Church also participated in the Westmoreland County Bicentennial (1773-1973) celebrations by contributing a float for their Frontier Parade, from Greensburg to Hannas' Town on July, 10, 1973, which memorialized our One Hundred and Fiftieth Anniversary theme.

Christ Church has been a helpful part of community life for one hundred and fifty years and we hope, and expect, that it will continue to fill this vital role for many years to come.

Much of the historical material in this commemorative booklet has been extracted from the "History of Christ Church" by Hugh Brady Welty of Greensburg and we are grateful to him for his permission to use it. Other material was taken from the booklet on The Rev. Dr. Shero's 25th Anniversary celebration.
