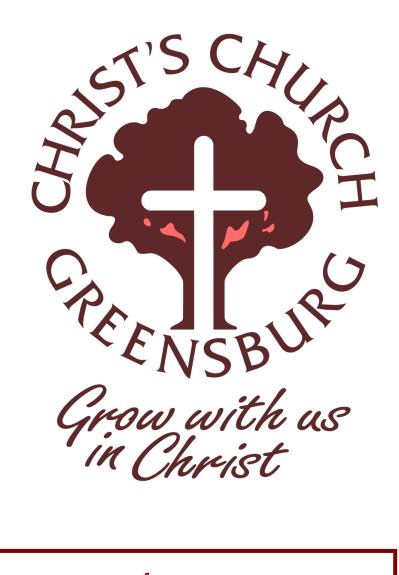

## MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF CHRIST'S CHURCH

March 4, 2018

After a combined Holy Eucharist service which started at 9:30 a.m., the Annual Meeting of Christ's Church was called to order at 10:40 a.m. in the nave by Father Jeff with a prayer.

A motion to approve the minutes from March 19, 2017, Annual Meeting was made by Alan Fleissner and seconded by Gene DiPrimio. Motion passed.

Father Jeff gave the opening remarks talking about the agreement with the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh. The documents have all been signed and presented.

ELECTION OF VESTRY: Amy MacMannis and Alan Fleissner have agreed to have their names submitted for re-election, and Nick Lynch has submitted his name to be added to the slate. Being that no other names were added from the floor, Father Jeff asked for a motion to vote all three together. Ruth Manson moved, and David Manson seconded the motion. Motion passed. David Manson then made a motion to accept the slate and Ruth Manson seconded. Motion passed.

CHILD EVANGELISM FELLOWSHIP: Father Jeff then introduced Kathy Sloan, the local director, to tell us about this program. She opened with a video clip that talked about the importance of teaching children about the love of God. Kathy talked about how children today need hope. She says she has the best job in the world because she gets to tell children about hope. CEF has three parts: Good News Clubs in schools; Fiveday Clubs in the summer, one of which will take place at Christ's Church this Summer; and teacher training. Christ's Church has given this group office space in the old nursery of the CE Building. March 17 she will have an open house.

BOY SCOUTS: Father Jeff announced two scouts are completing their Eagle Scout projects here at Christ's Church. One project is the library, and the other is the playground.

#### **REPORTS:**

FINANCIAL - Marsha Tallant, Treasurer, reviewed the 2017 Unaudited Statement of Financial Position and the Statement of Activities and the 2018 budget as presented in the Annual Report.

Father Jeff thanked Marsha Tallant for her work preparing the finances and for her work on the vestry.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION – Tom Thompson talked about how precious children are to God – loud and sticky. He thanked Amy Dancu and Dennis Hyland for their work with the children. He also mentioned Esther Yant and her dedication.

A new middle school education program has started on Sunday mornings at 9:30 a.m.

Men's Bible study has been a big success on Thursday mornings.

Women's studies on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings continue to draw a nice number of women.

Last year the Nursery was moved to the undercroft.

FELLOWSHIP/OUTREACH - Ann Yutz and Dee Claiborne Thanks for all the help with various projects over the year especially those who knitted hats.

Help is needed for Coffee Hour after the 10:30 a.m. service.

In 2018 we will continue holding a Food Drive and coat drive. We will also continue our association with Bishop Lamido.

Dee talked about the Attitude for Gratitude when motorcycle riders get together to thank God for a safe season and pray for those who didn't make it. The first year three attended and there were 14 this past year. We serve food to feed their physical body and prayers for their spiritual needs.

Dee had presented a four-part series about opioid addiction. It was not well attended, but she hopes that in the future more will attend.

CHRIST'S CHURCH WORKERS – Freda Schultz announced that the past Friday 114 people attended the Salad Bar. She thanked everyone for all their support during the year.

COMMUNICATIONS –Father Jeff announced that we now have a fabulous webpage. He stated that we need a Communication Minister, a Website Minister and a Word Minister.

PROPERTY – Gene DiPrimio reported that the South porch is almost ready to paint. He thanked Nick Lynch and Don Born for painting windows. He reviewed how his budget was spent.

Gene and Alan Fleissner talked about the fact that the air conditioning system is on its last leg.

They introduced a Three-year Capital Building Campaign. The projects included in this are:

Air Conditioner - \$36,000 Men's Bathroom - \$20,000 Steps down the side of the CE Building -New lights in the sanctuary -Total \$80,000

The ushers passed out pledge cards for the Three-year Capital Building Campaign.

WORSHIP – Marsha Tallant thanked all who volunteer as part of the Worship. She asked for more volunteers.

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT - Passed

DEACON'S REPORT – Gretchen Peske reported on her involvement in the Greensburg Ministerium representing Christ's Church.

In November she participated in a Catholic Deacons' panel which discussed the role of ordaining women in the church.

She also talked about Christian Women Together and their monthly outings.

RECTOR REPORT – Father Jeff talked about a Pastoral Care Class he is hoping to start. Talk to him to sign up for it.

Father Jeff talked about the statistics in the church.

Q&A – Deacon Ruth Manson asked for people to join the intercessory prayer group that meets the first and third Tuesdays of each month at Redstone.

Howard Yant made a motion to adjourn the meeting at noon Many seconded. Motion passed.

Father Jeff closed us in prayer.

## TREASURER'S REPORT

In 2018, as seen on the Financial Statements, we just about broke even with only a small net gain in the Operating Fund. Thank you to all the people of the church who love God and this parish enough to support it adequately. New to this year's Financials:

• We have a new fund called Epiphany. This is because we are assisting Ligonier with their payroll. They reimburse us monthly for their payroll expenses.

Everything else has remained the same.

Our investments with Morgan Stanley lost value toward the end of the year as did the Stock Market. We lost about \$10,000. Most of this has been regained in 2019.

The audit of our 2018 books was done by Jeff Simpson, and he found no major discrepancies. Copy of report included.

The budget for 2019 remained about the same as prior years. There is a significant increase in Property because of the expectation of the cost of renovating the men's bathroom. Not enough money was raised in the Three-year Capital Building Campaign to cover all that will be needed for the bathroom and to replace the steps along the side of the CE Building parking lot. Father Jeff, Marsha Tallant, and Sara Frye received a 5% pay raises.

The annual parish picnic was held at Hempfield Park on August 26. A service was held before the picnic with Father Jeff officiating and Sara and Dave Frye leading the music. Peter Zakim

also made a guest appearance as an up and coming guitarist. Marsha Tallant chaired the event and provided us with homemade Sloppy Joes and many other delectable items. Everyone enjoyed the return of the magician and his bag of tricks. About 75 people attended, and all had a great time.

The annual Greensburg Christmas Parade was held on November 17, the Saturday before Thanksgiving. Although the weather was chilly, parade-goers found warmth and fellowship in the undercroft. Under the direction of Howard Finney and Greg Andreyko at the 10:30 and 8:00 services, respectively, the Greeters and Ushers continue to see that our services run smoothly from the rear of the nave. Howard also ensures we have ushers at funerals and holy day services.

We are expecting that new Prayer Book for the Anglican Church in North America will be coming out in the summer of 2019.

A new Celebrant's chair, in memory of Robert Plummer, was purchased from the Memorial fund in 2018. In 2019 two matching side chairs, in memory of Robert Wicker, were also obtained from the Memorial Fund.

## **CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

This year we continued to educate our children and youth about our Lord and our faith, with the Lord's help.

The elementary Sunday School classes met from 10:30 – 11:00, and were taught by our dedicated Sunday School teacher, Amie Dancu assisted by our Christian Education Director, Dennis Hyland. Each week the students are prepared based on the weekly Bible lessons. Then the children related what they learned during the worship service. The elementary classes were small last year, but we are hoping for growth in the coming year.

The middle school class continued to meet from 9:30 – 10:15. For the first part of the year, they conducted an overview of the books of the Old Testament, looking at each book briefly and how they fit into the Bible. The class completed their outline in the fall then began Confirmation Class. The Confirmation classes were taught from late November to the end of January, leading to eight confirmands being confirmed by Bishop Hobby on February 3, 2019.

The Men's Bible continued to meet on Thursday mornings under the leadership of Dennis Hyland, with the men attending reporting how much they have learned about the Bible. They began going out to breakfast on the first Thursday of each month instead of their Bible lesson.

Seasonally on Wednesday and Thursday mornings, in the CE Building, Women's Day Out meets. They study a variety of books. ## **CHRIST CHURCH WORKERS**

The mission statement of the CCW is: "To glorify God in relationships and activities, and to encourage a servant's heart toward God, the church family, and our community." We have many opportunities to practice this mission statement with our unique ministry.

The CCW had another excellent year. Our fundraisers are thriving, and the support from the church family has been outstanding. Some highlights of the year are as follows:



Our <u>Salad Bars</u>, six each year, continue to be a major fundraiser and provide many opportunities for ministry and fellowship. Christ's Church is recognized in Greensburg for delicious, homemade food at its salad bars, and our goal is to serve at least 100 guests regularly. However, our attendance has been somewhat lower due to the ever-present lack of parking.

Be assured that our salad bars are so much more than the money. Fr. Jeff is asked many times for prayers and counsel, another essential part of his ministry.

The salad bars run smoothly with our seasoned helpers, because everyone knows what to do, and they do it well. One of our guests, who attends regularly, has given the CCW a \$50.00 donation at Christmas for the past few years. No leftover food is wasted; first to the helpers in appreciation for their help; the Welcome Home Shelter, a needy person or family. whatever situation presents itself.

The <u>Lunch</u>, <u>Soup</u>, <u>and Bake Sale</u>, in December only, is a trendy event and is our biggest and best fundraiser. In 2018, we had a variety of homemade soups and baked goods, and our net income was \$1,393.47. This sale requires a considerable amount of work but is definitely worth the effort.

Our <u>Frozen Pie Sales</u> are another fundraiser, held twice a year — one in May and one in November for the holidays. We offer 16 kinds of pies (including no-sugar-added) in addition to pumpkin rolls. Many orders come from outside the church regularly.

Scheduling our <u>Christmas Dinner</u> on a Saturday after the holidays has been one of our best decisions. About 100 adults and children attend, far more than in the past. Our next dinner will be on Saturday, January 4, 2020, at Lakeview.

At our January 5, 2019 dinner, Gary Pratt, a local singer, entertained us with a variety of songs. It was a great evening.

<u>Funeral Luncheons</u> are a ministry that the CCW provides to help and comfort parishioners in the death of a loved one. The CCW and the family work with a caterer to present their choice of food. We serve the food, provide tableware and centerpieces, and do final clean-up. We also offer a sheet cake and beverages at no expense to the family.

<u>**Donations**</u> from our fundraising events during the past year helped us to be good stewards of Christ's Church and our community as follows:

Checks are written in June, after the last salad bar, and usually includes a sizable check to Christ's Church for the Building Fund.

The CCW also assists with various Fellowship events, as needed.
