

Along with the students, we, too, return to study with our new 2019 Book of Common Prayer. I received my copy a few weeks ago, and it is beautiful. I cannot believe how much I missed praying out of a prayer book; I had to relearn a few practices to make prayer time more enriching.

As I pray this new prayer book, I hear the echoes of Thomas Cranmer saying if this is a prayer book of the church, every member of the church should have one and pray it. I realize this book is not something you pick up and start praying if you have never used one. It is not difficult to use, just slightly different. I cannot overemphasize the importance for all of us to pray using this prayer book. That said, we are dedicating this year to learning not only how to use the prayer book, but also learn its history, richness, and beauty.

This summer, we've tweaked *The Word*. We reduced the frequency to four times a year to align with our liturgical seasons. In addition, we dedicated this year to the 2019 Prayer Book. Please attend the classes we will offer to learn how to use it. Our website links to training videos and other resources for using it. the 14th Chapter of John's Gospel, Jesus says to His apostles, "Believe in God, believe also in Me" (verse 1). Following this statement, Jesus describes His Father's House as having many rooms, and that He will go to prepare a place for them. He says, "And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take You to Myself, that where I am you may be also. And you know the way to where I am going" (verse 3). Thomas, being confused, said to Him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way? Jesus said to him, "I am the Way, and the Truth, and the Life. No one comes to the Father except through Me. If you had known Me, you would have known My Father also. From now on you do know Him and have seen Him" (verses 5-7).

"For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave Himself as a ransom for all" (1Tim 2:5-6). The sight of Jesus, as described in His heavenly place with His Father, gives us all strength to pray in His name. We are not left alone in our prayer life as we pray for others. Our small prayers of intercession are completed and reinforced by the eternal Intercessor, Jesus Christ. So, how do we pray in Jesus's name? Jesus says to us, "If you abide in Me and My words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you" (John 15:7). To pray in the name of Jesus means to pray in full assurance of the understanding of the great gifts Jesus has given us by His life, death, and resurrection...and our eternal salvation. It means to appeal to the blood of Christ as the source of power for the life of prayer. It means that without Christ we are helpless apart from His intercession. Therefore the content of our prayers must be in unity with His nature. Our prayers represent Him abiding in us and we in Him.

When we move from asking God for ourselves and ask God on behalf of others, we are moving towards selfless, or self-giving prayer. In our lives now, in this 21st century, nothing is more critical than Intercessory Prayer. Just look around, be open to others. Share with others, and actively listen to others. No one is without some kind of a pain in their lives. Whether this is in marriages, with children, with elderly parents, with sickness, death, mental illness, addiction, or financial distress, no one is immune to suffering and pain in life.

When we begin to pray for others, besides ourselves, we soon discover that it is easy to become discouraged at the results, or apparent lack of results. We can become frustrated with the lack of outcomes. This process is laborious for us to accept, and we can quickly become so disheartened by it. It is easy to give up. But Jesus gives us an altogether different vantage point from which to view our prayer work. Prayer, he says is a little like a helpless widow who refuses to accept her helplessness and instead stands up to injustice, and her persistence wins the day (Luke 18:1-8) God wants us to be persistent in prayer. He wants us to keep asking, keep seeking, and keep knocking. One of the hardest things for us to accept is that His timing for answering prayer is not our human timing. We don't know why or when, God will answer our prayers, those for us, and those for others. Jesus teaches us to have patience, joy, understanding, courage, and strength. All of this, He gives us when we ask for His grace to help us in our prayer life. Intercessory prayer is selfless, meant to speak to God on behalf of others and always asking His Son to be the Way, the Truth and the Life, in interceding for us.

## St. Timothy's Cross

(Part ll)

s promised, here is the follow-up to the article that apeared in the last issue of *The Word* regarding St. Timothy's Cross: As parishioners at St. Paul's Summerville (South Carolina), we were blessed to have four priests serving our parish.



One of them, Fr. Gary Beson, became a close friend. Gary is a graduate of Trinity and served on the streets of Pittsburgh's southside during and following his attendance at Trinity. Originally from Columbus, Ohio, his family relocated to Summerville when he was a boy. He is a "BROWNS" fan. Thus, you see the connection we had!! Gary was ordained an Anglican Priest by Bishop Mark Lawrence on October 17, 2014, shortly after we moved to Summerville. Cindy and I attended the ceremony!

For those that follow the Anglican Diocese of South Carolina, and in particular, St. Paul's Summerville, you know that "OUTREACH" is the name of the game! Spreading the Gospel is paramount, and planting new churches is very high on the agenda.

As a new priest, the bishop assigned Gary to plant a new church. With the population in the Cane Bay area (where we lived) expanding very rapidly, this was a natural location.

Gary teamed up with Pastor Donnel Liferidge, Vicar of St. Paul's Reformed Episcopal Church. Pastor Liferidge granted use of their facilities for the new church plant to begin. It didn't take long for Gary to pull a team together and on November 29, 2014, services began on Saturday evenings. The name of the new church: St. Timothy's!

One Sunday, long before Gary's Institution as Vicar of St. Timothy's, he saw me wearing the cross and asked about it. He then said to me in jest: "You know Steve, you have to give me that cross as I will be the Vicar of St. Timothy's!" The very next day, I contacted my brother to send me another cross. On the eve of Gary's Institution, Cindy and I presented him with a gift of the cross. Gary was in tears and actually wore it to bed that night!

St. Timothy's has grown at a fantastic rate and outgrown their home at St Paul's and are looking to purchase land to build their own worship facility.

Indeed, Fr. Gary Beson continues to practice the Apostle Paul's words on the back of the cross:

"Be an example to the believers in speech and conduct, in love, in faith, in purity" (1 Tim. 4:12).

Our salad bars offer one of the best opportunities for us to interact with our community. This tradition should be maintained to the highest degree possible. You have provided some of the best food, and requests for your recipes are not uncommon from our guests.

Many of you have been quite generous with your food donations and your time as helpers. *Thank you!* 

Just bear in mind that sometimes it is a challenge to keep the tables full of food selections.

We are proud to serve the best homemade food in town, and this is your invitation to join us for lunch. Don't forget to bring a friend!

You get TWO Sundays to sign up in the undercroft. *Don't forget to write the date on your calendar!* Food can be delivered to the undercroft on Thursday during choir practice (7:15 to 8:30 p.m.) or Friday after 8:30 a.m.

REMINDER: Please use the flashers on your vehicle when parking by the door to the undercroft to avoid getting a ticket.

Please label your containers AND lids, with your name. After the salad bar, the bottles are displayed on a table in the undercroft. Please get yours as soon as possible.

The young people from Clelian Heights, with adult supervision, continue to walk several streets in Greensburg to distribute our salad bar flyers to various businesses. Gwen Diddle is responsible for volunteering their services. Also, 80 copies are given to the courthouse for all of their mailboxes.

#### Frozen Pie Sale

The Frozen Pie Sales are scheduled twice a year—November and May. The first one is Wednesday, November 20. The pies and pumpkin rolls are great for the holidays, and they also make thoughtful gifts. Please consider buying at least ONE so we can make our sales profitable.

#### Lunch, Soup, and Bake Sale

The date is Friday, December 6, for this sale. The homemade soups and baked goods are always a big success, in addition to our salad bar. People shop first for soup and baked goods, then they eat! This is our biggest and most popular fundraiser and requires the most time and effort.

- \* A motion to send the City of Greensburg \$500 in lieu of taxes.
- \* A motion to pay \$148.70 for new purifications out of the Memorial Fund.
- \* A motion to accept the audit from 2018. Thanks to Jeff Simpson for his work to complete this.

It was announced that Nick Lynch and Brandon Daily will be entering the seminary through our parish. They each have been awarded scholarships of \$10,000 through our Scholarship Fund.

Income is \$129,126 which is 57% of our budget. We should be at 58.3% so we are slightly under budget.

Expenses are \$123,958 which is 53.3% of our budget.

This results in a current net gain of \$5168.

Total in checking was \$33,770, in savings and investments \$128,818.
