

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Reflections from Fr. Jeff

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s Lent approaches, I know some of you are planning on giving up sweets, chocolates, smoking, alcohol, cursing, eating out, and even carbs! Giving up things is truly a prayer and a sincere offering to the Lord. I by no means want to deter you from a pious act to deepen your relationship with our Lord. For others of you, you find giving up things for Lent as odd and uncomfortable. I jokingly say that I give up skydiving and water polo. In reality, I try to either give up or take on something that I not only do for Lent but for the rest of my life. So needless to say, I have learned to take baby steps.

Recently, Bishop Jim Hobby stated that we need to prepare ourselves for church. I was instantly brought back to my seminary days in studying St. Ignatius. He was a Roman Catholic priest and theologian who was the founder of the *Society of Jesus* (a scholarly religious group). Coincidentally, he died four months, 10 days after Thomas Cramer in 1556. One of the most powerful take away points I had from reading his work was about preparing to pray.

St. Ignatius suggests the way to prepare for Lent is by preparing to pray. His questions to us are:

- Have we physically set aside a prayer space for our Lenten journey?
 - What time of day will we pray during Lent?

What are the "exercises" or prayer methods we will be using during Lent? In our preparatory prayer during the spiritual exercises, we pray for specific graces.

- What is the grace we desire to deepen within us during Lent?
- To deepen our understanding of Jesus' Passion?
- To walk with Jesus through His Passion and Resurrection?
- To work on overcoming a temptation that keeps us from fully entering into life with Christ?

To foster a new spiritual practice to ignite or inflame our relationship with Jesus? In these last few days before Lent begins, I invite us to begin our preparatory prayer. We can

turn to Jesus and ask, "What is the grace You desire to deepen within me over these next 40 days?" If you choose this challenge for Lent, know you will be joining me. Either way, you are in my

prayers! Amen!

Corporate Prayer: What Does That Mean?

ost people understand the word "prayer" is used by us as God's children to communicate with Him. As His people, we can experience joys and sorrows in life, which often leads us to pray. We often forget to thank God for the joyful events and people in our lives, but it is not unusual for us to be reaching out to Him in prayer when we experience sadness, sorrow, or suffering in our day. Prayer can take many forms and take place in many places throughout our day. When driving the car, grocery shopping, caring for our children, experiencing quiet moments at work, at church or away from church all open the opportunity for prayer. Corporate prayer means praying in groups.

Quietly meditating is a form of prayer. Using one word or a mantra is a form of private prayer. Many years ago, my spouse, Derek, and I took a Christian meditation course from our Anglican priest. He included focusing on one's breathing as part of meditating. He encouraged us to think of a simple word or phrase repeating it over and over. All of this is a form of private prayer. In our human life, the Holy Spirit doesn't take time off. He is always at work, guiding us, teaching us, protecting us, and pushing us. Jesus said, "Again I say to you, if two of you agree on earth about anything they ask, it will be done for them by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst them." (Mt: 18:19–20) (KJV)

I have heard people say, "I don't need to go to church, I am spiritual." This expression of a person's faith journey is partially true. People can experience private prayer but are missing out on corporate worship. They are missing out on having others pray for them, per Jesus' command of "where two or three are gathered together." We don't live in silos, we live in community and God has given us one another to help one another. This includes praying for one another.

Whether we pray in private or in public, the Bible gives us guidance on how to pray. We are to pray with **humility**, as scripture says in James, "Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will lift you up" (James 4:10). We are to be **obedient** in prayer, as the Bible tells us: "Dear friends if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence before God and receive from him anything we ask because we obey his commands and do what pleases him" (1John 3:21–22). We are to be **thankful** and **not anxious** as is taught us in Philippians, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God" (Philippians 4:6).

When we let ourselves sink into prayer, whether in corporate or private prayer, we can allow the Holy Spirit to enter our hearts. Feeling the warmth of the Holy Spirit is comforting, is peaceful, and is exhilarating. We can truly let our anxieties and worries be carried off and replaced with a sense of relief that "everything will be OK," as our Father in Heaven promises us. He is with us, He will be with us always. How can we doubt our Heavenly Father who is Almighty, all good, all truthful, all loving? Prayer is a human expression of communication with our Father. He has designed us to have a prayerful life. By developing a deeper relationship with God, with His Son, Jesus, we are really guaranteed to have lives which are guarded and protected by the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.





ervices for Ash Wednesday, March 6, will be held at 12:00 noon and 7:30 p.m. This is a time to begin your penitential Lent. Ash Wednesday is a Christian holy day of prayer, fasting, and repentance and falls on the first day of Lent, six weeks of penitence before Easter. The priest makes a sign of the cross on your forehead with ashes made from palms from Palm Sunday. As he applies the ashes, he says "Remember that you are dust, and to dust, you shall return." Which is based on the words spoken to Adam and Eve after their sin, to reminds worshippers of their sinfulness and mortality and thus, implicitly, of their need to repent in time. The priest makes a sign of the cross to remind us that forgiveness can only be accomplished through Jesus Christ.

The Man Who Rediscovered God and Changed the World



By Eric Metaxas

On All Hallow's Eve in 1517, a young monk named Martin Luther posted a document he hoped would spark an academic debate, but that instead ignited a conflagration that would forever destroy the world he knew.

Five hundred years after Luther's now famous Ninety-five Theses appeared, Eric Metaxas, acclaimed biographer of the bestselling Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy and Amazing Grace: William Wilberforce and the Heroic Campaign to End Slavery, paints a startling portrait of the wild figure whose adamantine faith cracked the edifice of Western Christendom and dragged medieval Europe into the future.

Written in riveting prose and impeccably researched, *Martin Luther* tells the searing tale of a humble man who, by bringing ugly truths to the highest seats of power, caused the explosion whose sound is still ringing in our ears. Luther's monumental faith and courage gave birth to the ideals of liberty, equality, and individualism that today lie at the heart of all modern life.

Favorite Recipes from the CCW Salad Bar

ALMOND SUGAR COOKIES

2³/₄ cups flour 1 tsp. baking soda ¹/₂ tsp. baking powder 1 cup butter softened 1¹/₂ cups sugar 1 egg 4 or 5 drops almond flavoring

* Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

* Stir together flour, baking soda, and baking powder. Set aside.

* In large bowl, cream together butter and sugar until smooth. Beat in egg and almond flavoring. Gradually blend in dry ingredients. Roll teaspoon of dough in ball and place on ungreased cookie sheet. Cookies will spread as they bake. Bake 8 to 10 minutes until golden brown.
