



The Minister shall begin the Evening Prayer, by reading one or more of the following sentences of Scripture.



HE Lord is in his holy temple; let all the earth keep silence before him. Hab. ii. 20.

From the rising of the sun even unto the going down of the same, my name shall be great among the

Gentiles; and in every place incense shall be offered unto my name, and a pure offering: for my name shall be great among the heathen, saith the Lord of hosts. *Mal.* i. 11.



EARLY beloved brethren, the Scripture moveth us, in sundry places, to acknowledge and confess our manifold sins and wickedness; and that we should not dissemble nor cloak them before the face of Almighty God, our heavenly Father, but confess them with an humble, lowly, penitent, and

obedient heart; to the end that we may obtain forgiveness of the same, by his infinite goodness and mercy. And although we ought, at all times, humbly to acknowledge our sins before God; yet ought we chiefly so to do, when we assemble and meet together, to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his most holy word, and to ask those things which are requisite and necessary, as well for the body as the soul. Wherefore, I pray and beseech you, as many as are here present, to accompany me with a pure heart and humble voice, unto the throne of the heavenly grace, saying—

¶ A general Confession, to be said by the whole Congregation, after the Minister, all kneeling.



LMIGHTY and most merciful Father; We have erred and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against thy holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; And

we have done those things which we ought not to have done; And there is no health in us. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, miserable offenders. Spare thou those, O God, who confess their faults. Restore thou those who are penitent; According to

thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesus our Lord. And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake, That we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, To the glory of thy holy name. Amen.

The Declaration of Absolution, or Remission of Sins; to be made by the Priest alone, standing; the people still kneeling.



LMIGHTY God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desireth not the death of a sinner, but rather that he may turn from his wickedness and live, hath given power and commandment to his ministers to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the Absolution and Remission of

their sins. He pardoneth and absolveth all those who truly repent, and unfeignedly believe his holy Gospel. Wherefore, let us beseech him to grant us true repentance, and his Holy Spirit; that those things may please him which we do at this present, and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure and holy; so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

¶ Then the Minister shall kneel, and say the Lord's Prayer; the people still kneeling, and repeating it with him, both here, and wheresoever else it is used in Divine Service.



UR Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; Thy kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven; Give us this day our daily bread; And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil:

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

O Lord, open thou our lips;

Minister. Let us pray.


O Lord, show thy mercy upon us;

THE COMPLETION OF THE NEW CHURCH

As written by The Rev. H. Hobart Barber, Rector 1901-1907

The church is of Native stone and is a fine example of Early English Architecture. It is cruciform with recessed choir. Extreme length ninety-six feet; extreme breadth across transepts sixty feet. In the belfry hangs the bell which did service in the old church for thirty-five years. The choir steps and floor are of Georgia marble, as is the floor of the sanctuary. The red oak ceiling in bays, and the exposed beams springing from the stone corbels are carved in heads, give great dignity and beauty to the interior.

THE NORTH TRANSEPT

The windows in the baptistry were the Chancel windows in the old church and were given by Mr. Caleb Cope of Philadelphia, a true friend to the parish in the

first days of the second church (1856).

The font, erected by the Honorable George F. Huff and Mrs. Henrietta B. Huff in loving memory of their children, is a combination of Caen and Indiana limestone; it is Gothic in design, and was adapted from an old English font after suggestions made by the donors. The bowl is octagonal, with decorated and inscribed faces. The bowl has the following text of Scripture in relief: "They follow the Lamb, whithersoever He goeth".

At the angle of the north transept and choir walls, is a strikingly beautiful pulpit, the gift of Mr. Walter Kåtte, "To the Glory of God and loving memory of Margaret Jack Katte," wife of the donor. The Pulpit is an adaptation of the pulpit in Armagh cathedral, Ireland, the ancient seat of St. Patrick. The Pulpit is nearly six feet high and is octagonal in form. The decoration on the front panel of the superstructure is a glorified cross; of the two side panels, one is the Greek monogram of Christ—(Chi Ro) and the other the Greek letters—(Alpha and Omega); carved heads of cherubs with outstretched wings form a complete circle around the upper part of the die. The base of the superstructure carries the appropriate text of Scripture, "Sanctify them through Thy truth".

The Altar and Reredos are of white marble, and rise upon three steps of the same material from the sanctuary floor. Six columns of blue Rutland marble finished with foliated capitals and bases of Italian marble support the Altar. On the white marble gradine are carved the words, Sanctus, Sanctus, Sanctus. On the central panel are the familiar letters I. H. S. (Jesus Hominum Salvator). This memorial was given by Mr. Wilson Baughman, "To the Glory of God and in loving memory of Sarah Spencer Baughman, his deceased wife. He Giveth His Beloved Sleep."

THE SERVICE OF BENEDICTION

On December 2, 1891, all of the above gifts were in place and ready for the Episcopal Benediction. The joy of coming into this splendid new House of Prayer and of Holy Sacraments, can better be imagined than described. It is needless to say that the church was filled with parishioners and their friends. Bishop Whitehead blessed the memorial gifts and administered confirmation to a class of four. THUS THE THIRD CHRIST CHURCH, IN GREENSBURG, WAS OPENED FOR THE WORSHIP OF ALMIGHTY GOD, AND THE EDIFICATION AND SANCTIFICATION OF HUMAN LIFE.
